It is with a heavy heart that I must announce the postponement of Scribehaven for February 2022. Unfortunately, Lake Barkley suffered a devastating fire on November 28. Several lodge rooms were totally destroyed while others on the same wing had severe damage. As a result, one whole wing of lodge rooms will remain closed for the near future as they investigate the fire and face recovery and rebuilding. Fortunately no one was killed or injured in the fire. In addition to the fire, they are still following Covid protocols which means the dining room is closed and they are facing a staffing shortage. Upon hearing the news, I suggested that we cancel our February reservation and push the reservation to February 2023. That said, I will remain in touch with the park in hopes that we might be able to do something in late summer or early fall depending on availability and their ability to recover from the fire.

A Letter a Week 2022

Welcome to a letter a week 2022, a project that is primarily about having fun, experimenting and having a regular, small project to focus on each week. We have done a similar program in the past, but this one is a bit different.

The aim is simply to: - Write/create one letter each week, ending with 52 letters. These letters can form one complete alphabet with both upper and lower-case letters, two separate alphabets, 52 of the same letters (upper and lower case) done in various lettering styles, or any combination of letters that you choose.

The main rule is that the letter must be presented on a piece of material measuring 3" by 3" or smaller – this helps keep a sense of uniformity amongst the pieces, which helps with exhibition coherence. If you choose, one alphabet could be "black and white with a touch of..." That means it is primarily a black and white alphabet with the opportunity for a touch of something to lift the piece or make you smile (maybe red or gold or whatever you choose).

The final letters could be preserved as a framed piece (perhaps for an exhibit), in a scrapbook, an accordion book, or in another method of your choosing.

Let's begin 2022 with a fun lettering project!

This presentation will take a roundtable format, with many of our members showing their works for similar projects from the past. Botanical Art 101

Stop and smell the roses as Miranda teaches you beginning botanical art! This 2-day workshop invites you to relax and enjoy the plant world in a creative way and encourages self-expression during the process. You will learn how to study, draw, and color your favorite botanicals.



The first day, we will cover the differences between botanical illustration and botanical art, how to examine plant life, creating your art space, basic drawing techniques with graphite, texture, shading, and blending techniques with colored pencils.

The second day will be spent on watercolor techniques and adding fine details. Miranda will also

demonstrate masking and background techniques.

WORKSHOP REVIEW

Grisaille Vivian Mungall Reviewed by Ann Cobb

The Grisaille technique is how Baroque and Renaissance painters were able to achieve dramatic and realistic looks to their paintings. It was traditionally done in oils, but can be done in watercolors. Grisaille is a French term that means to paint in monotone, and is pronounced qrəˈzī.

Vivian taught us to tap in watercolor to create shading on gold. We experimented with Finetec golds, gold gouache, shell gold, and mica powder, and a small watercolor brush.

We first painted our design with our choice of gold. When the gold was completely dry, we tapped in watercolor with a very dry brush after testing the dryness of the brush on a piece of scrap paper. Paint is applied where the shadows would be to give a subtle 3-dimensional effect.

The grisaille effect is very subtle, but adds much to the design.

Vivian also taught us to mix powder gold and mica powder to flow through a pointed nib. She uses Elmer's clear, washable glue, distilled water, and gold powder, mica powder, or glitter. This mixture must be stored in an air-tight container to maintain its fluidity.

The leaf scroll design had brown watercolor added as shading. The holly leaves had green watercolor shading added.

Vivian is always so generous in her sharing of information and techniques. I encourage you to take advantage of any workshops that she offers.





Calligraphy: A Complete Guide Written by Julien Chazal Book Reviewed by Ann Cobb

There are countless calligraphy books available today. Many are good; some are great; and some – well, we will leave that to reader discretion.


One of the most comprehensive I have found in a long time is <u>Calligraphy: A Complete Guide</u> by Julien Chazal. This 223 page book is comprehensive in its coverage of the art of calligraphy and the history of many scripts.

It begins with an introduction to calligraphy, covering writing tools and mediums for both broad-edge and pointed-pen lettering.

But the heart of the books is the coverage of scripts broken down into these categories:

- Roman Scripts
- Medieval Scripts
- Gothic Scripts
- Modern Scripts
- Contemporary Scripts
- Decoration and Layout

For each of the more than 30 scripts, the author gives 2 pages of history and description of the hand and 2 pages of exemplars for the hand. The sections on formats and layouts provide discussion and several examples of the topics.



If you are looking for a comprehensive book that covers a wealth of information, this may be the book for you.
