For those who are new to weathergrams and for those who haven't done them in awhile, Chris Hackenbrack will show you how to combine the love of calligraphy with the love of nature.

"We will talk about their history, and we will make one for ourselves.

Bring your favorite lettering utensil, markers, brush pens, nib and ink, whatever you are most comfortable with. While an Italic lettering style is traditional, you can make your weathergram using your own personal preference of lettering style. It is best if the ink is waterproof, and tradition is for the ink to be black, red, or white, but again, we will be flexible and creative here.

## **WORKSHOP REVIEW**

Calligraphy Design and Norse Runes with Ann Miller Review by Beth Paul

I have always been curious about runes, those ancient symbols found carved on stones throughout Europe, but I have never had an opportunity to study them. I was excited to see that a class was being offered through the Stanford Continuing Studies program in California. When I saw some of calligraphy with runes that Ann Miller had done, I knew I was in for a treat. Most people are not aware of this ancient alphabet or how often it is still being used. (Hint: look up the logo for Bluetooth.)

The class was two hours long, once a week for four weeks (7-9 pm PST which meant 9-11 pm my time!). Before our first class, we were given links on youtube to learn the basic history of where runes came from and how to pronouce them. In the first class, we learned how to draw each one and how to write our names. Since the words are written phoenetically, fewer letters are needed. We progressed to writing common words, phrases, and short quotes during the second class. Homework was writing out a lengthy quote which was proofed by Ann before we rendered it in color. The third class was devoted to writing with different tools like the ruling pen for different effects and how to combine runes into monograms (again, Bluetooth). The last week was the final project: designing a modern runestone and creating a lifesize replica on paper (actual carving was optional but not required). Like any art project, careful planning on layout and tools used were a big part of it.

The runes are an ancient form of writing, but during this fun and informative class with Ann Miller, I discovered they are a fascinating alphabet to learn.

# **Charming Cherub - A Valentine Messanger with Heather Held** Review by Beth Paul

Heather Held has taught well over a dozen workshops over just the past few months. I would know because I took most of them. I don't know how she found the time to add another one, but she did - and so I had to have it too. It was a half day session on how to draw cherubs, in honor of Valentine's Day.

For this project, Heather drew the largest element first, the scroll for the message. She sketched a ribbon winding around the scroll with bunches of flowers for accent. Then she showed us how to draw a cherub's face. Heather discussed the ways of arranging elements to hide parts of the cherub so drawing would be easier. I decided to draw two cherubs, using references in the handouts.



Heather quickly showed us how to paint each part of the project, including the wings. She also shared her formula for mixing paint for skin tones. I did not have the colors so I used colored pencil. She showed us how to shade the scroll, the ribbon, and how to paint the flowers. Because it was such a short amount of time, we did not finish our projects in class but Heather made sure all our questions were answered and we had plenty of instructions to follow.

Heather is such a wonderful teacher, very patient and thorough. I always know I will enjoy learning something new in her class.

#### **Pointed Pen Variations with Mike Kecseg**

I have actually wanted to take this class for quite a while. I am very happy that Zoom and the Edmondson Calligraphy Guild have given me the opportunity. This was an 8 hour class, split into two 4-hour sessions on consecutive Saturdays in February. In the first session, Mike spent a good amount of time going over the very basic what's and why's of nib selection and pen selection (straight or oblique), as well as paper and body position. This was a great review for me and excellent information for a beginner. Mike taught 3 variations, a variation on Copperplate that he called The Informal Pen, a variation on Blackletter that he called Pointed Pen Blackletter, and a variation on Uncial that he called Pointed Pen Uncial. He sent a wonderful set of exemplars for each style that included the basic strokes, the lowercase, the capitals, and a quote lettered in the particular style. He also sent pages of examples of how to mix the variations in fun ways as well as a few examples of taking the variations ever farther.

Mike considers calligraphy a form of drawing and he emphasizes the proportions of white and black space, however, his process is not mathematical or rules based. While he taught the 3 styles that he created, he also went into detail regarding how he got there and in doing so, gave the student a blueprint for creating their own variations of any style they choose. This is, I think, the most valuable part of his lessons, giving me the road map to create my own style of lettering in a more organized fashion. The sessions were recorded and the recordings are available to the students until the end of April. Along with the recordings, the ECG also sent pdf's of his demonstration pages. Mike was a wonderful teacher, casual, personable, and knowledgeable, and I am so glad I was able to take the class. I highly recommend this class if you are ready to branch out and not only learn some fun pointed pen variations but also are interested in creating some variations of your own.




Ok, so you've taken a few lettering classes and have a few hands under your belt. Great! But what's next? You've seen all the

Using favorite tools and a favorite quote, students will be led through a series of exercises that will focus not only on the lettering but on

layout, composition, and the negative space that is created. Principles of graphic design will be introduced as we discuss where the next letter or word should go; where and when to apply color; and the steps it takes to get to a finished piece.

For the last several years, we have seen a resurgence in "calligraphy", thanks to modern variations on pointed pen lettering. Unfortunately, the more traditional broad-edge letterforms seem to have taken a backseat. One of the most beautiful and versatile broad-edge alphabets is Italic.



As many of you know, I love Italic; but no matter how much we love any letterform, our interest in the basics wanes. We begin to take what we think we know for granted, and we may become sloppy in our approach. This fuels dissatisfaction with our work and disenchantment with the letterform itself.

> Does this sound familiar? If so, grab your pens and spend a weekend revisiting and refining your italic or possibly visiting




