## THE MATERIALS OF THE SAINT JOHNS BIBLE:

a new extended studies course taught by Reggie Ezell

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Maria Helena Hoksch: gold leaf on acrylics: watercolors and gouaches on

#### Planned:

The final weekend at Carson-Newman University studying illuminated manuscripts from across the centuries, employing many of the materials and techniques presented in this course.

The Saint Johns Bible: Heritage Edition! Up close and personal with one of the volumes. A chance to study this life size, brilliantly reproduced, rare book. (note: The current cost of the full seven volume set is approximately \$165,000.)

The greatest work of art in western calligraphy and illumination in the last 500 years is the Saint Johns Bible (www.saintjohnsbible.org). It is created with materials that reach back millennia: calfskin vellum, guills, stick inks, dry pigments, gilding, and more. The designs, though grounded in tradition, always have a contemporary flair. The intention of this extended studies course is to be immersed in these materials and techniques in order to produce a finished work, broadside or book, integrating these materials and

### SOME of the CURRICULUM to be COVERED

### Writing Surfaces:

*Paper, Vellum, Parchment:* preparing and adapting these surfaces to receive various fluids, paints, and gilding.

*Lining*- Varieties of ways to line writing surfaces based on the demands of individual projects.

### Gilding:

**Bases:** -Instacoll, Acrylic gesso, Gum Ammoniac, Traditional Gesso, and more **Metal leaf:** seven different **Tools:** brush, pen, textures

### Writing Implements:

*Metal nibs:* broad edge, pointed, ruling pen, ball pointed pen: adapting them with honing (several), reservoirs, distempering, snipping. *Quills:* cutting and maintaining them

Writing Fluids: Gouache, Watercolor, Ink Sticks: (black and color), Dry Pigments, *Binders:* gum arabic, glair, yoke

## **WORKSHOP REVIEW: "A Sharp Pencil and a Keen Eye" with Amity Parks**







You know an artist is serious about her art when she routinely gets up at 3:00 am to work in her studio for 3 hours—for years. There's a lot to be learned in her presence. Amity Parks is serious about her work, and she is also an engaging, humorous teacher. It was a pleasure spending two days with her as she discussed her work, her processes, and her journey to where she is today.

I'm like most people—been using pencils since age 3. But who knew there was so much more to a simple writing tool?! Or so many ways to sharpen lead? Or that your eraser is equally as important as your pencil? After this workshop, I have a new appreciation for pencils and graphite in all its forms. Like all Nashville Calligraphy Guild members, I have a decent collection of tools and art supplies—but Amity introduced me to a variety of graphite tools I've not used before. During "A Sharp Pencil and a Keen Eye" workshop, she shared how she used pencils, erasers, graphite sticks/blocks, powdered graphite and water-soluble graphite to create her artwork.

For two days, we were busy from 9 until 4:30 and used every minute learning and creating. Amity packed in a lot of information! The day consisted of demos, instruction and discussion, then back to our tables for practice. Amity checked in with every participant during the practice sessions to answer individual questions. On day one, we worked with mono-line letter forms, drawn letters and layout techniques. On day two, Amity moved on to watersoluble graphite. She demonstrated techniques for interior shaded letters, working from wet to dry and dry to wet. She also demonstrated using stencils with powdered graphite, and writing into powdered graphite with water.

The weekend was chock full of many techniques for using our tools in creative and imaginative ways; but the most valuable part of this workshop was the peek behind the curtain. As Amity demonstrated her techniques, she vividly described her thought processes. Perhaps the most revealing glimpse into her artistic creative process was during the Word Lockup with a Pencil exercise. Starting with a simple quote, she walked us through her process for designing word groups. She chose a quote new to her so we could follow along as she worked through some standard exercises she developed to create a unique word group. She took us along for the journey, explaining her thoughts, what design elements she was considering, and why she preferred one layout over another. Then, as we worked on our own pieces, she worked with each of us individually. She generously shared her eye for balance and form, her design skills and guidance.

Amity provided a workbook for the two days so if you wanted to just watch her demos, all the notes were provided, along with samples of each technique. It was very useful during the workshop, and definitely a great guide for taking home to the studio to continue practice. While she managed to squeeze in a lot of techniques, there was plenty of time to get in practice and personal review with each of 19 participants. I came home with my own samples of each technique to use as references for my future work. This workshop definitely added to my skills. If you missed this one, definitely keep a keen eye out for another opportunity to sharpen your lettering and design skills with Amity Parks. - Ruth Farwell
